2 Vice President's Report – Samantha Van De Kerckhove

Membership for the Saskatchewan Geological Society dipped this year, with a total active membership of 89, the lowest it's been in at least 10 years. Part of the reason for this change is likely due to technical problems with our website registration page at the beginning of the year. Our website provider was eventually able to fix the problem but it is likely that that some registrations were missed. While the error was occurring, members who registered through the website would receive a receipt of registration from the website but were never actually charged for the transaction, and thus, not entered into our system. We hope this was a one-time only issue and we will see a rebound in membership in 2023.

Our emailing list contains both active members and those with lapsed memberships, so while active membership was down to 89 people, 327 people remain on the mailing list. Please see the summary below.

5 Treasurer's Report - Dillon Johnstone

This is an unaudited financial report for the Saskatchewan Geological Society's (Society) 2022 fiscal year, which began on January 1st, 2022 and ended on December 31st, 2022. The *2022 Balance Sheet*, *2022 Profit and Loss Statement* and *2023 Budget* are presented at the end of this report. What follows are the highlights of the Society's financial activity during the 2022 fiscal year.

Summary of Income and Expenses

The table below summarizes the net income/expense of our annual operations.

In 2022, the Society ran an overall net surplus of \$17,717.23, with expenditures \$298.24 more than budgeted and income \$6,482.77 more than budgeted. The surplus is largely due to higher than expected calendar sales income, some of which was outstanding from 2021 calendar sales, promotional clothing sales and the APEGS \$1,100.00 sponsorship to the Dr. Don Kent Core Workshop printing fees. As of Dec 31st, 2022, the Society holds a balance of \$57,898.21 in our general operations account.

In 2022, major income (net) contributing to the Society's annual operation balance included:

- 1) the bi-annual Williston Basin Petroleum Conference (WBPC) Dr. Don Kent Core Workshop grant (\$13,047.29);
- 2) APEGS annual grant (\$4,000.00) from which \$100.00 was designated to Geoscience Calendar sponsorship;
- 3) publication and volume sales (\$3,105.01);
- annual membership fees (\$2,835.00);
- 5) the Saskatchewan Geological House honorarium (\$1,092.84); and
- 6) promotional clothing sales (\$1,032.87).

As of Dec 31st, 2022, the Saskatchewan Geoscience Calendar had \$7,501.88 in income including \$4,801.88 in sales and \$2,700.00 in sponsorship and incurred \$4,929.98 in expenses for a net surplus of \$2,571.90. In part this large surplus is due to 2021 calendar sales income that was deposited in the early part of 2022. This is typical for the Geoscience Calendar account as the period for sales occurs around the fiscal year end. Please refer to the Geoscience Calendar Committee Report for more information.

Major expenses (net) contributing to the Society's 2022 annual operation balance included:

- 1) general operations expenses (\$4,402.04), such as for website hosting and service, liability insurance, Quickbooks, Stripe, etc.;
- 2) the Society's annual field trip (\$1,947.08);
- 3) luncheon talks and speaker expenses (\$1,180.67); and
- 4) student awards (\$850.00).

A total of \$1,260.00 in refunds were issued by the Society in 2022. Of this total, \$1,200.00 were for cancelled registration for the annual field trip.

Other Society Accounts

What follows are a few notes on accounts held for specific purposes, outside of the Society's main operating account:

- 1) Laszlo Fuzesy Student Poster Award: In 2019, the Fuzesy family donated \$20,000.00 to the Society. In January 2020, the executive decided that the funds would be used to support the Laszlo Fuzesy Award for years to come. The award is presented annually to the best graduate student poster at the Saskatchewan Geological Open House. In addition, the funds will also support the second and third place prizes in the graduate student poster contest. As of Dec 31st, 2022, the balance on the Fuzesy donation account is \$17,005.89.
- 2) GeoExplore Saskatchewan website: In 2019, APEGS provided a \$9,090.00 sponsorship for the development and maintenance of GeoExplore Saskatchewan. Since the donation was made, \$4,681.00 has been used for website development fees and \$1,753.17 has been used for website hosting and licensing and operational fees. As of Dec 31st, 2022, the balance in the GeoExplore Saskatchewan account is \$2,655.83.
- 3) Saskatchewan Geological Open House: Each year, the conference is organized so that the event breaks even. The income and expenses for this event are separate from the main operating budget of the Society; any surplus from this event cannot be used toward regular Society business; any loss is not expected to be covered by the Society. Some expenses are still outstanding but the following numbers were calculated based on reasonable estimates of these

expenses: the conference made a profit of \$1,611.18 and the balance in the Open House account should be \$54,284.73 after all remaining bills for the 2022 event have been paid.

2022 Budget

The Society budget is created from the calculated average income and expenses over a three-year period and then adjusted based on what is expected for the coming year. Given the disruption that the COVID-19 pandemic brought to the Society's core functions and related financial activity in 2020 and 2021, the Society's 2022 budget is based on the calculated average of income and expenses in 2018, 2019 and 2022. Because the 2022 Annual General Meeting and curling bonspiel did not run, those events were not factored into the budget calculation. Additionally, as part of the Society's education and outreach operations, the executive agreed to provide \$1,000.00 annually for school lesson plan development in 2022, 2023 and 2024. While no education and outreach funds were used in 2022, the Society will continue to budget the agreed upon amount of \$1,000.00. Also included in the 2023 budget is \$5,000.00 for a review of the 2022 financial statements of the Society. This resolution will be voted on at the Annual General Meeting. Overall, the Society projects a deficit of \$10,865.00 to run our 2023 operations. The overall net surplus of \$17,717.23 in 2022, which is largely due to the bi-annual Dr. Don Kent Core Workshop grant, will be used to offset the projected deficit.

The 2023 Saskatchewan Geological Open House budget was produced separately because the conference is meant to run as a break-even event and therefore it is required that the income and expenses are managed and tracked independently. The Open House account has no bearing on the income and expenses of the general Society finances.

Guaranteed investment certificate (GIC)

The Society renewed its TD one-year cashable GIC in April, 2022. As of December 31st, 2022, the GIC has a value of \$33,027.65 and an interest rate of 1.6%. The GIC will renew automatically at the end of each term, unless we decide otherwise.

Best Practices

It is a suggested best practice that a non-profit organization such as the Society should have between three and six months of budgeted expenses as reserves. The projected expenses for 2023, without including the Open House account, are \$46,265.00; thus, the Society needs between \$11,566.25, and \$23,132.50 in reserves. The Society currently has \$57,898.21 in its general account and \$33,027.65 in a GIC, for a total of \$90,925.86, and thus has an acceptable amount of money going forward into 2023.

AGM Resolutions

The Saskatchewan Geological Society's Executive has decided to put forth two resolutions pertaining to the financial statements at the upcoming Annual General Meeting on February 4th, 2023. First, under Saskatchewan's Non-profit Corporations Act, 1995, DIVISION XIII, Section 150(1), the Society resolves not to appoint an auditor for the 2022 financial records. If this resolution passes with a 2/3s majority, second, under Saskatchewan's Non-profit Corporations Act, 1995, DIVISION XIII, Section 150(4.1), the Society resolves to appoint a person to conduct a review of the 2022 financial statements of the corporation.

6 Program Report – Brendan Bishop & David Thomas

Due to the ongoing pandemic, the 2022 speaker program continued with online presentations, however as restrictions eased, we were able to transition towards hybrid talks with our first live talk in over two years occurring in April. The ability to host both hybrid (in-person and online) and strictly online talks each have their own benefits, the hybrid talks provided the chance to meet in a social environment while also allowing those not able to attend to tune in virtually, while the strictly online talks allowed us to broaden the range of speakers available to present to the society. This format allowed for presenters from Saskatchewan, Alberta, BC, North Dakota, Oregon, Ontario, and Switzerland. In total, the society hosted 13 talks in 2022: four hybrid and nine online with speakers from academia, industry, and government. Attendance ranged from 20 to 60 participants.

The presentations covered a wide variety of topics including deep time, geo-tourism, economic geology and critical minerals, sedimentology and paleontology, petroleum geology, and structural geology. As in previous years, we were fortunate to host speakers from national and international organizations including the AAPG Distinguished Lecturer Dr Rebecca Dorsey online in March as well as the 2021 GAC Logan Medallist Dr Kurt Konhauser for our final talk of the year in December. With the return to inperson events we look forward to hosting travelling speakers from various societies and organizations in 2023.

The program chairs would like to thank all of our speakers in 2022 for taking the time to impart their knowledge on our members and support the society. We would also like to recognize the support of our members by attending these talks and ensuring it continues to be an important activity for the society and the greater Saskatchewan geology community.

In 2022 we wanted to gather some data to see if the lesson plans are actually being used and get some feedback from teachers on how useful they are. We decided to post them on a website called *Teachers-Pay-Teachers* where teachers can share resources either free or for sale. We posted a variety of our lesson plans and related resources for free, starting in March 2022. As of January 17, 2023, we had received 8113 Page Views, 4874 Downloads and a rating of 4.5/5, from 28 votes. This website serves teachers across North America, so we don't know how many of the users are from within Saskatchewan, but it seems there is a market for geoscience teaching resources.

Looking Forward

In 2023 we plan to complete all the lesson plans that are under development. We're also considering rolling the Education and Outreach Committee into the GeoExplore Committee to make the most of our volunteer resources. We will work on a plan for implementing that in 2023.

7.2 Field Trip Committee Report

Chair - John Lake

Saskatchewan Geological Society 2022 Annual Field Trip to Flin Flon, Manitoba.

This year we went to Flin Flon to check out the structure and volcanic stratigraphy of this prolific mining camp (August 26-30, 2022). The Field Trip was led by Michelle De Wolfe (Mount Royal University, Calgary), David Thomas and Neil Richardson (Hudbay Minerals). Eleven SGS members joined up with 16 Mount Royal University students to roam over the excellent exposures of the volcanics, Missi metasediments and later plutonic rocks. Michelle De Wolfe gave us an introductory lecture outlining the volcanic stratigraphy of the area: Extensional tectonics of the Footwall Flin Flon Formation (Blue Lagoon and Mill Rock Members) and the Hangingwall convergent Hidden Formation (1920 Unit, Reservoir and Stockwell Members) and Louis Formation (Tower, Icehouse and Undivided Members). Neil Richardson showed us massive sulphide drillcore from the Triple 7 orebody. His candid lecture outlined the limitations of geophysical techniques for massive sulphide exploration.



Karen Bawden (retired geologist) Dunja Sorenson (NexGen Energy Ltd) Extensive detailed mapping by the field trip leaders has made this one of the best-understood mining camps in the world. The rhyolite at the top of the Flin Flon Footwall succession input sufficient heat to set up a long term geothermal system responsible for the precipitation of the massive lead-zinc deposit. We looked at the evidence for a prospect in the Hangingwall Louis (Tower Member). The Missi sediments in the Annabell Lake Shear Zone were extensively deformed and metamorphosed to amphibolite grade. The Cliff Lake and Annabell Lake Plutons showed multiple deformation histories. Clays in the altered intervals makes it easier to deform. In 2022 the committee decided to hold bi-annual rather than quarterly meetings to discuss website status, future content and revisions, and promotion.

As reported last year, the conversion of the printed *Geological Highway Map of Saskatchewan* to the digital *GeoExplore*Saskatchewan website, which began in 2019, is now near-complete. The content we had planned to add at the beginning has now largely been added. In addition to the content from the

original map, which was migrated and updated, there are many additions that were not part of the original project. *GeoExplore Saskatchewan* is much more than the original *Geological Highway Map* ever could be and I encourage members to spend a few minutes to visit the site and browse through the pages. We also welcome suggestions for content.

What's New in 2022?

- The Critical Minerals Map symbology was simplified and updated;
- Many new photos including those from the 2022 Geoscience Calendar have been uploaded to the site;
- Work continued on various landform pages;
- Work is ongoing on a Geological Time Scale page, and
- Work underway on upgrading the content of the Campbell Rock Garden brochure.

The ArcGIS template that is currently in use by the *GeoExplore* site is old and we may need to spend some time and money to migrate the content to a new template in 2023–2024.

Traffic to the site seems to be steady at about 20 visits a day, although it drops off over the summer months.

The 2022 Saskatchewan Geological Open House was held Nov.28-30th, 2022 at the Delta Bessborough Hotel in Saskatoon. Once again, the conference was very well attended with over 650 delegates attending, 24 sponsors and 58 exhibitors. There were 30 geoscience posters on display including 13 student submissions (9 graduate and 4 undergraduate).

Four technical sessions were held Nov.29 and 30th featuring 30 geoscience talks by Survey staff, industry and academic researchers covering a range of topics including: mapping projects, exploration project updates and advances in exploration techniques.

Forty-eight delegates attended a short course presented by David Thomas on Uranium Geology 101. We were pleased to once again be able to offer our delegates an affordable geoscience learning opportunity hosted in Saskatchewan.

A break-down of the income and expenditures related to the conference are included in the budget section of this report.

The Saskatchewan Geological Survey and the members of the Open House Organizing committee would like to thank the Society for its continued involvement in, and support of, the Geological Open House. This alliance enables both partners to fulfill their mandates of supporting the mineral exploration industry and promoting geoscience in the province.

7.6 Williston Basin Petroleum Conference Report (Erik Nickel)

The Williston Basin Petroleum Conference was held from May 24-26, 2022 in Regina. This was the first in-person WBPC held in Canada since the spring of 2019. The conference was regarded as a success with 413 attendees, many great talks, and lots of exhibitors. The focus of the conference was "Energy From the Earth"; highlighting all of the new subsurface energy and minerals such as Helium, Hydrogen, Geothermal, CCS and Lithium in addition to traditional oil and gas.

In keeping with this theme, the SGS once again hosted "The Don Kent Core Workshop" in memory of Dr. Kent, highlighting many of those same new minerals and energy sources. The workshop was also a success with 37 attendees viewing 6 presentations on everything from Precambrian basement evolution to Mannville stratigraphy. As a result of missing the 2021 conference due to the pandemic, the WBPC is once again being held in Regina May 2-4, 2023, and the intention is for the SGS to host a pre-conference workshop once again.
