Similarities between Archean and Proterozoic PGE-bearing mafic intrusive complexes of NW Ontario and those found in layered gabbroic intrusions of the Peter Lake Domain in northern Saskatchewan

The Peter Lake Domain, a southeastern component of the Hearne Province in northern Saskatchewan, includes several granitic and gabbroic complexes that range in age from 2.70 to 1.83 Ga. Several platinum-group element (PGE) occurrences are hosted by the oldest and most extensive suite of gabbroic rocks, the 2.56 Ga Swan River Complex, which was intruded into granites and granitoid gneisses of the Hearne Craton. But at least one of the PGE-occurrences (Antoine showing) is in gabbros of the much younger 1.92 Ga Porter Bay Complex. Supracrustal rocks make up only a very small percentage of the Peter Lake Domain. The domain has been variably affected by several thermotectonic events during the Neoarchean and Paleoproterozoic.

In 2005, three PGE-bearing mafic intrusive complexes were visited in NW Ontario and many similarities to the Saskatchewan intrusions were noted in regards to lithology, texture and style of mineralization. Among the Ontario examples was North American Palladium's Lac des Iles mine, currently the only primary Pd-producer in North America. The Coldwell Complex near Marathon and the Entwine Lake Intrusion, 400 km west of Thunder Bay, were the two other areas visited.

This informal presentation will discuss the regional context, geology and mineralization of the Ontario intrusive complexes and compare them with our 'home-grown' examples. There will also be a bit of "Pt-Pd 101", time permitting.
