'The Unofficial History of the Light Microscope'

Abstract

The light microscope is one of foundations of the natural and physical sciences, and is itself, in its form and composition, the product of a fascinating history of evolving scientific and technological development. This talk presents an illustrated examination of this history, with particular attention to a small part of the cast of characters that participated in it.

When viewed within the historical context of the Renaissance, the English Reformation and the Industrial Revolution, the light microscope and its waxing and waning popularity over the last four hundred years provides an interesting commentary on society as a whole. Given impetus by the curiosity of pioneering 'natural philosophers', the microscope emerged to become a standard feature of almost every educated household during the so-called 'golden age of the microscope', a time when amateur microscopical societies existed in every major city. This, in turn, led to the explosive development in form, function and the application of microscopy as we know it today.

Much of the technology we take for granted in any given contemporary light microscope can be traced to various humble beginnings in the seventeenth, eighteenth, and nineteenth centuries. Such developments are often attributed to a small number of recognisable scientists or 'natural philosophers', but were often in fact the result of the efforts, creative spark, felicitous accidents and persistence of numerous scientists, amateurs, craftsmen and artisans. As with so many human endeavours, there were those who laboured silently and were subsequently forgotten, those who achieved well-deserved pre-eminence, and those less deserving.

A number of antique microscopes from Stephen's personal collection will also be on display.


"Unofficial Spring Field Trip"

Saskatchewan Geological Society SPRING "CAMPING" FIELD TRIP

to

Eastend T-Rex Museum, Cypress Hills West Block, Writing-on-Stone Provincial Park

June 2nd to 4th (or 5th), 2017



Day 1 (Friday, June 2), meet at Southland Mall, Swiss Chalet parking lot, 0800 hrs, leave Regina for Eastend T Rex museum, visit with Curators Tim Tokaryk and Emily Bamforth for awhile, then head to West Block Cypress Hills "**unserviced** group camping site", move in, and take over.....hopefully no later than late afternoon (total distance~390 km to Eastend via Shaunavon, plus ~100 km to West Block camping).

Day 2 (Saturday, June 3), check out Conglomerate Cliffs, "Mystery Rocks" (see attached photo), potential sites in Sask "West Block", plus west into Alberta side where the rocks are better exposed.

Day 3 (Sunday, June 4), continue with visits to the various localities Alberta / Sask., as above......or not. Return to campground, break camp by early afternoon, and make our way homeOR for an optional 4th day, head west to Writing-on-Stone campground (~200 km), set up camp, check out the Cretaceous Milk River hoodoo exposures and stare at the very closeby Sweetgrass Hills / 50-54 Ma, early Teritary igneous uplift just across the line in Montana.

Day 4 (Monday, June 5), goof around at Writing-on-Stone, possibly check out the petroglyphs from which the park gets its name (from the 1971 SGS field trip guide, "Despite the fact that the drawings have been protected by establishment of a provincial park, many of the rock faces containing the drawings have been so badly mutilated that it is difficult to distinguish ancient artistry from contemporary idiocy".) And when we have had enough, we head back to Regina, likely a 6 hour trip from Writing-on-Stone.

NOTES



- This trip is an "unofficial" one, and not financially supported by the Society.
- Participants supply their own transportation / food / beverage / camping needs (campers, tents, bivy sacks, whatever) / and camping fees. The organizers will supply itinerary / road log with directions to campgrounds, possibly some knowledgeable guides, and that's about it.
- Carpooling is encouraged. If enough folks wish it, we can likely rent a multi-passenger van for the trip for those not hauling a camper. Contact organizers if this idea would work for you.
- The "West Block" does not require any pre-booking for camp-sites. If planning on taking in the Writing-on-Stone part, we have a "group site" pre-booked for the Sunday, June 5. If staying on longer than that, folks will possibly have to book a site (Reserve.albertaparks.ca or phone 1-877-537-2757).
- The trip is meant as a **family & friends type venture**......kids, pets, etc. are welcome. If the weather cooperates, the early summer scenery in these areas is beyond compare. If the weather looks to be uncooperative, we may have to cancel, or re-tool somehow; in wet weather, roads can become impassable in this fairly remote part of the parks (and campfires hard to light).

We will send out an update announcement in mid-May to assess potential numbers, car-pooling options, and weather.
